Barbara Brown Taylor, in her book, <u>Learning to Walk in the Dark</u>, writes of the significance of Jesus' resurrection taking place in a dark place. There is no spectacle to this moment, but there is hope for all of us who dwell in darkness and the shadow of suffering and death. For all of us who see our vocations to be to willingly share in people's darkness, injustice and pain, we trust in the hope that emerges from the darkness. We cling to the folded cloths of the tomb as we enter the darkness of trafficking, addiction, exploitation and pain, knowing that Jesus sits in the darkness with us. He sighs the first breath of his resurrected life into us that we might share that life with others. Welcome to the darkness, where we share in the coming light.

Gracious Christ breathe into us the breath of your new life. Dwell with us as we join you in the darkness. Give us hope in your beginning breath and keep us from fear. Give us courage and grace, and guide us by your hand, for we cannot see what you see. May your peace dwell in our hearts, and your glory be made known to all. Amen.
