

## Wednesday Prayer - Fifth Sunday in Lent

A poem by author and survivor Regina Fowler in her book, Will you be made whole reads:

I'll strengthen you even as you get old.

Don't you know every tear you cry,

I have them stored up in heaven in a bottle?

I want you to share the same joy as I,

so take my hand.

Let me lead the way, as my word is true.

I have a way of making all things brand new.

Earlier in the book she talks about growing up in a physically, mentally, and emotionally abusive home. "I grew up looking for love in all the wrong places." She shares how this led to drugs, crime and prostitution. She was lost and broken, with all hope gone. Someone told her about Jesus and she thought "Why not try Jesus?" She says over time Jesus put her heart back together and made her whole again. She goes on to say, "There is a cry for help in this world today but I'm here to say that you are loved, you are somebody, and God has a plan and purpose for your life. You can be healed and restored."

God of hope and healing, you know our troubles and hear our cries. Bring hope to this broken world. Help us to lead the way for a new thing to spring forth, to work for justice, healing, and safety for all of your beloved children. Amen.
